Dear Friends,

As we prepare for Christmas this year we also will be preparing to thank our Youth Minister, Sue Cromer, and our Senior Associate to the Rector, Sara Palmer, both of whom at the end of December are finishing their ministries with us as they begin the next chapter of their work and life in the church. We will, of course, be collecting a purse for each of them to acknowledge their faithful and life-giving ministry in our midst.

Mother Sara has accepted a call to be the rector of All Souls Episcopal Church across the river in the Diocese of Washington. This parish is excited about growing in the Gospel and increasing their numbers as they rebuild (like all of us) after Covid. Sara's warmth and enthusiasm make her the ideal candidate to serve as their next rector.



After 11 years of working with our youth and documenting the beauty of God's creation and people through her exquisite photographs, we rejoice at the lasting impact that Sue has made not only on our young people but all of us. Sue and I have been in conversation about the timing of this transition since the spring. She is accepting an interim position at a nearby parish so we will still have her close by at least for the short term. Under Sue's guidance, our kids have grown closer to Jesus and to the church and for that we are all so very grateful.

We will honor both Sue and Sara, giving thanks for their ministries after the 10am service on December 17th. If you would like to donate please make checks payable to Saint Mary's marked "purse" or online. As a result of our need for all us to be gathered together to celebrate and give thanks, we will not have Wilderness Church on Sunday the 17th. Wilderness Church will be held on December 3rd and next on January 7th.

2023 has been the year of transition for clergy and staff at Saint Mary's. We will create the new position of Family and Youth Minister that Jackie has agreed to fill. I am so grateful that she is eager to bring her many gifts and talents to this new hybrid position, one that is normative to Episcopal parishes our size. That said, 2024 will need to be the year of strengthening volunteer lay leadership throughout our congregation. We each have gifts for the building up of the Body of Christ (the Church). The world more than ever needs the light of the Gospel to shine bright through our individual lives and through our collective witness as Saint Mary's. If you have not made a financial commitment for next year, please do. It is important for your individual relationship with God and corporately so that we can staff appropriately. We are committed to paying a living wage in very expensive North Arlington. I am also so grateful to Andrea and Holly who joined the staff taking the reins in administration and finance this year. Finally it is hard to believe that the Rev. Janettarose has been here only since August and ordained to the Priesthood in September. Her presence and leadership have already had a major impact in our common life together.



An Anthology for the Ages




everal months ago two of my erstwhile Virginia
Theological Seminary classmates asked if I would
consider contributing to a book they were thinking about
putting together. I'm so glad I said yes. Classmates
Herschel Wade and Christoper Poore served as the editors.
The book is entitled, Looking For Our God: Voices of Color Speak
from Virginia Theological Seminary.

Their objective was to create a space where students, staff, and faculty of color could express themselves fully and still be comfortable in the sacred space and rarefied air of Holy Hill without having to contort ourselves or our thoughts or feelings to meet unnecessary and oftentimes impossible standards.

My contribution starts on page 59, it is an exegetical remix on Jeremiah 31:31-34 and a popular 1980's song "The Rain." It was written with deep respect and reverence for my Old Testament professor Rev. Dr. Judy Fentress-Williams, who shared with me that the song "The Rain" by Oran "Juice" Jones was not only a classic but one of her all time favorites.

This book is about belonging, acceptance, and transformation of not only people but also the institution known as VTS.





Looking for Our God, not a monolith, it is a rich and layered mosaic of voices, opinions, style, and perspectives; all artfully arranged and simmering around the belief and celebration of our Triune God.

The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. St. Mary's Visits the Episcopal Church's Office of Government Relations in DC

n Saturday October 21st, a couple of folks from Saint Mary's (namely Mother Sara, Mark Lagon, Marjorie Barclay, and Kevin Ahearn) paid a visit to the Episcopal Church's Office of Government Relations in DC to learn a little about the work they do. We met with two of the staff there, whose names were Lindsey Delks and Susie Faria. The Office's job is to encourage members of Congress to pass bills that reflect resolutions passed by the Episcopal Church's General Convention, which is held every three years. They also operate the Episcopal Public Policy Network, which is dedicated to keeping Episcopalians informed about legislation of interest to the Episcopal Church, and providing resources that allow those of us who don't work on Capitol Hill to get involved in getting such legislation passed.

The National Episcopal Church's Office of Government Relations was as informative as it was hospitable. The dialogue in a historic building of religious organizations next to the Supreme Court and across the street from the U.S. Capitol was inspiring and indicative of rich opportunities for witness to public causes of justice for Mother Sara Palmer, Kevin Ahearn, Marjorie Barclay and the Mark Lagon.

Susan Faria and Lindsey Delks of OGR painted a picture of their office's role engaging the Congress and Federal Government on issues prioritized in resolutions from General Convention. They made clear how with a lean team they cover a broad swath of domestic and international public policy issues (evidently, as the metaphor goes, the light-weight boxer punching far above their weight class). Observing the white board in the OGR conference room of

issues the staff cover in their portfolios – from access to voting to human trafficking - drove home the breadth and importance of the office's agenda informing policy-makers.

The St. Mary's group engaged the OGR staff on specific issues that are priorities in their advocacy and might be in our own. Most notable were issues (grounded in General Convention resolutions) of criminal justice and the differential treatment of groups based on race.

Faria and Delks raised particular opportunities for prayerful Episocopalians in advocacy to members of Congress as constituents, and as "ambassadors" within church and local communities for issues of social

justice. One takeaway was how Faria and Delks stressed that all legislators, irrespective of party, ideology or inclination to serve the dignity of "the least of these," need to hear from churchgoers on issues to motivate them to move those causes higher on their priority list amidst a wide and messy array of issues and thousands of bill introduced. Sometimes simply noting the existence of some other legislator's worthy bill to co-sponsor and hence increase the chance of getting to the floor and passage is a significant achievement for Episcopalian citizens. Whether more or less experienced in Washington advocacy, to a person, members of the group were struck by opportunities to address the priorities of our own church community (racial justice and pluralism, stewardship of the planet in face of climate change, and beyond.)

Greetings in Jesus name! I pray you are all doing well.



On behalf of Shalom Orphans Rescue Center, Kenya, I hereby write to express our heartfelt gratitude for the immense support we received from St. Mary's Arlington Episcopal Church. May God bless you so much. I also register my heartfelt gratitude to the Rev. Sarah Palmer whom I shared with the projects I initiated in my community in Kenya to share God's love with the vulnerable. She prayed with me and for the project and shared with me about St. Mary's Outreach support. She also collected clothes for our children from the congregation. May God bless the Rev. Sara.

We received a total of \$5500.

This sum of money enabled us to buy food stuff, toiletries that will support the program up to December 2023. We were also able to construct a two-doors pit latrine and a separate bathroom. The essential amenities have saved the children from going to the bush to relieve themselves. The latrine is very beneficial because they are now living in a conducive environment free from cholera and some diseases that can be found in dirty environments.

We also bought school uniforms for ten children and they are happy and feeling blessed. Thank you all for putting smiles on the vulnerable childrens' faces.

The grant has been used a means of spreading the gospel of love in our community. It has made a difference in the lives of the children. They are able to take three meals a day. The children's academic performance has improved because they go to school happy and ready to learn knowing that they have something for lunch. Their self-esteem has been developed. All these we give glory to God.

Words may not express our deepest appreciation, but we are humbled and grateful for the support.

We are sending our prayers and love to St. Mary's Arlington congregation, outreach committee, and Lynn.

We look forwad to continue being in partnership in God's mission.

Living out our Faith at Home this Advent

estled at the foot of the Blue Ridge Mountains sits my parents' little Christmas tree farm, where friends and neighbors come by after Thanksgiving to select and cut their own tree. Each tree takes a minimum of 7-10 years to grow to about 6 or 8 feet tall, and they are very susceptible to environmental threats (pests, weather, and our favorites, bear and deer!) so you could say that this is a labor of love and patience for my family. Every year, I stroll through the rows of Turkish Fir, Korean Fir, Blue and Serbian Spruce, White Pine and about fifteen other varieties wondering which one I might cut down and decorate in my own home. Because of the increasingly small selection, and because I know just how much work goes into caring for every tree, I feel a sort of call to pick the trees that have some "character"- it might have a crooked trunk, some yellowing needles, or even some missing branches because of our favorite wild friends! In many customers' eyes, my tree might be overlooked, even criticized for its imperfections, but I choose it because it is beautifully and wonderfully made, just like each and every one of us imperfect children of God. As we prepare for the coming of our savior, let us never forget how beloved we are, flaws and all.

Here are some ways that you and your family might prepare for Jesus' birth at home this season:

Make an Advent wreath (from a St. Mary's Kit or from materials you have at home). The four candles around the wreath represent hope, peace, joy and love, and the fifth candle in the middle **represents Christ, the light of the world.**

Think of ways that you can be a blessing to those in our community.

Remember those in need by bringing in a coat or gloves during our collection drive, show kindness to your neighbors, and remember them in your prayers before dinner or before bed.

If you decide to decorate a tree at home, read this blessing:

"God who created the birds of the air, the fish in the sea, the stars in the sky, and the trees in the ground, bless this tree as we decorate it and make it a joyful symbol in our home. May its branches remind us of the shade and shelter You provide for us and for many creatures. May its trunk remind us of Your strength. May its lights bring us peace. May we remember Your gift to us this season, the gift of baby Jesus." Amen*



Sue Cromer, Youth Minister bids us farewell at the end of 2023

December 2023



I report to you, sadly, that my time at St. Mary's is coming to an end at close of 2023.

I am very thankful for the opportunity to spend 11+ years with a wonderful, generous, faith filled congregation that, as I always remind our young people, is, has been, and will be church family!

I have had the privilege to be friend, mentor, and teach several generations of young people at St. Mary's. Their faith, humor, and love has enriched my life and leaves me a changed person.

I knew I was in for an adventure when, on my interview weekend with St. Mary's, the most important interview consisted of being closed in the Vestry room with room full of teenagers and a box of doughnuts and told "go!" Apparently I passed the test!

How do we measure our time together? Our lives have included countless chicken wings at Wing Night, more pizza than any human being should consume, time spent together at Shrine Mont in meaningful ways, time talking about the small things and the big things, goofy games that even included my favorite – pool noodles. Together, we survived a pandemic, spent many hours on Zoom, and prayed for one another. Together we confirmed over 200 youth and baptized 12 teenagers. I am not sure how to fully count the number of teenagers impacted by our ministry here. We shared Mission trips where our youth and adults were transformed to make a difference in our world. We supported local outreach efforts



on a regular basis. There have been tough moments we have walked together, and many moments of laughter and joy!

I have also had the gift of engaging in ministry with many faithful people at St. Mary's in countless ways that go far beyond the formation of young people, allowing us to walk in faith together.


Baptism at St. Mary's

What a joy for me to baptize baby Charles "Chip" Carroll Junior at St Mary's on Sunday November 19th at the 10 am service. Forty family members and friends came to share in this wonderful celebration of Chip entering God's family, marked as Christ's own by the Holy Spirit FOREVER. It was lovely to meet with the parents and godparents for the hour long pre-baptismal class, and to be able to deepen our understanding about the meaning of baptism. How can we as parents and godparents serve as role models so that Chip can see the love of God in a way that he as a baby and child can understand?



I recommended Archbishop Tutu's *Children of God Storybook Bible* (about \$13 from Amazon) for children ages 2-6 years old. If you have never read the Bible before or a Gospel in its entirety, I recommend starting with Matthew's Gospel, one chapter a day. If you don't have a Bible in a version you understand, I recommend The New Oxford Annotated Bible (red hardback version) in the New Revised Standard Version with the Apocrypha- costs about \$38 from Amazon. As we get to know Jesus, God's only Son in the Gospels, we can understand in a deeper way what the invisible God is like: God's values, hopes and dreams for God's world.
