

### Choral Evensong and Good Church Music



#### Choral Evensong Sun., March 3, 5:00 pm

Choral Evensong is an entry into the spiritual realm of prayer through the beauty of music. The service is short, requiring little of the congregation but open ears and open hearts. At the English Reformation the monas-

tic daily offices of Vespers and Compline were combined into

one service called Evening
Prayer or Evensong for use in
cathedrals and parishes. (The
daily offices do not include a
sermon or the Eucharist.) At
Choral Evensong the choir takes
a primary role in offering prayer
and praise on behalf of the
congregation. Because of the
rich and vast corpus of music
written for Evensong by composers across the centuries to our
present day, Choral Evensong
has become one of the glories of



#### Good Church Music

In the Episcopal Church our corporate worship of God is structured by the liturgies of the Book of Common Prayer. These liturgies stand alone without the addition of musical elements. An entire service may be spoken or read from beginning to end and be considered complete. The addition of church music can serve several purposes. By singing words

of the prayer book instead of saying them, we have a wider or more specific form of expression that can be added to these words. Music measures the pitch, rhythm, and inflection while allowing for an emotional response that is more pronounced than the spoken word. We may also add sung texts to the liturgy such as hymns and anthems which amplify the words of the liturgy in prayer and praise or

comment on a text such as a lesson from the Bible in a way that serves to teach or proclaim. So music does much more than offer a vehicle for our praise to God. It can also allow other texts to be written upon our hearts in a way that admonishes us or comforts us. Hymns or anthems can be musical sermons, if you will, that comment on the readings of the day or exegete a theme of a season of the Church Year. Good Church Music

therefore begins with texts. What texts best serve the purposes of the liturgy in a corporate sense? Here is a non-exhaustive list, just a beginning: Does the text stand alone as a reliable expression of the Christian faith as found in the Episcopal Church? Are the words themselves a reflection of the vocabulary we find in scripture and the Book of Common Prayer? Does the text serve a function within the liturgy that edifies an intergenerational congregation? Is the text crafted in a way that its meaning deepens over time? Does the text point to scripture and the testimony of the church as sources of understanding? Am I both comforted and confronted? So the measuring stick is not so different for the texts of musical portions of the liturgy as it is for the prescribed liturgical texts. They reinforce one another and mirror each other in the way that they point us to God, and the Word Himself Jesus Christ.

## Post Pandemic: Two Things **Demanding Our Attention**

Dear Friends,

As you are aware "organized religion" is on the decline in the United States and "nones" are on the rise. There are many reasons for this that persons far more qualified than I can speak to, but it is clear that all institutions are under stress in our rapidly changing world not just the Church. Trust in government, politicians, institutions of higher learning, and the military is in short supply and doesn't promise to be returning anytime soon. Trust, once lost, is difficult to regain.

What is hopeful is that "nones" have not lost belief in some sort of a higher power and are actively searching for ways of belonging and embracing a

larger meaning for their lives. Jesus' cautionary question rings true in our own day - "What does it profit a person to gain the whole world and forfeit their life?" (Mark 8:36) Money, power, sex, and fame can only take us so far. The Episcopal Church is grateful to continue in our generation, the hard work of becoming a community of faith that welcomes all people and all questions regardless of where we find ourselves on the journey of faith. That should make us a logical destination for those who identify as spiritual but not religious. That said, however, it is fair to point out that post pandemic there are two things that demand our renewed attention. The first is to rebuild a sense of belonging, of profound community, that seeks to address the deep loneliness in this country that our Surgeon General has labeled an epidemic. Loneliness can lead to depression that can lead to despair that can lead to death. It tragically happens all around us. The second thing to recognize is that because persons are less inclined to come to church, we need to go and seek them out. "The harvest is plentiful but the laborers are few; therefore, ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest." (Matthew 9:37-38)

Let's be honest with ourselves. What exactly are we inviting our friends and relatives or acquaintances to join? Are we really a welcoming inclusive church family that is attractive to folk who are already pre-disposed not to expect much? Where do we need to put time and energy into ensuring that we are in fact who we say we are? Who among us is going to do it and what exactly is the "it" that we are going to do?

brick built us into what we enjoy today. Many of those saints have gone on to their reward but many are still among us. Brick by brick. One small act of love and kindness connected to another, to another. To continue that metaphor let me offer a couple of concrete possibilities.





Rebuilding Together's signature event is National Rebuilding Together Day, which takes place on the last Saturday of April. Since 1988, the Arlington, Fairfax, Falls Church affiliate of Rebuilding Together has been organizing this effort locally and St. Mary's parishioners have been involved nearly that long. Last year, a thousand people volunteered locally to make significant repairs to 30 private homes and non-profit residential facilities.
