

## A Message from Mother Meg

Sweet Friends in Christ,

Sometimes things take us by storm. Unexpected. Dramatic. Think of the dust storm which enveloped Arizona this past week. Seemingly out of nowhere the dust began to accumulate, engulfing a wide area of the state, causing cars to have to pull over because they could not see in front of them, causing planes to stay way above in the air because landing would be unsafe. People in the middle of it could see it, but they could do nothing about it—just live through it, survive it. And most did.

Sometimes change comes upon us like a dust storm, blinding us to things right in front of us, frightening us into stillness, into submission to its overarching power, filling us with the need to ride it out, to survive it, to let it pass over so that we will be able to shake off the sand, clean out the dust, seek out the sun when it is all over. We often feel small and insignificant and powerless. We may even wonder where God is in the momentary savagery of the situation.

Lately, I have had my own dose of hunkering down as the storm of a retina detachment forced me to submit to a course of allowing the storm to blow through or allow blindness to take over my life. What I have come to understand in this overpowering demand to lie still is that no matter the problem, no matter the outcome, God is with me. I have a family built of marriage and blood which has cared for me, and I have had a family of the heart, including our St. Mary's family, who have reached out and prayed for me and fed me with food and love. Each of you has given me hope in the midst of my personal dust storm. But isn't that what community is all about?

I know that we are living through a time of transition—not just at St. Mary's, but in our nation and throughout our world. But we need to remember that no matter how great the storm, we at St. Mary's have one another. As we get the new program year underway, as we gather for worship and fellowship and formation and outreach, as we celebrate and educate and pray for one another, we find ourselves to be a vibrant community who somehow sees through any storm, any transition, any change because we have love for one another and for our world—and praise for our God who sees us through.

I give thanks for all of you. Watch for the good things coming your way this fall. Sign up to be a part of God's ministry on Ministry Sunday. Look forward to the Hootenanny and the Homecoming. Continue the good work of 100 Years of Love in Action.

Inspire those in authority with zeal for reconciliation.


And grant to each of us empathy and understanding for the stranger, the unloved, the unlovely, and the enemy. Praying together...


We beseech you to hear us, good Lord.

Last month, St. Mary's once again participated in the backpack drive sponsored by True Ground Housing Partnership (formerly APAH). True Ground is a DC-area nonprofit real estate developer with deep roots in Arlington. It operates dozens of affordable housing properties which are home to more than 800 school-age children. The purpose of the drive is to provide a backpack and school supplies to those children, helping them to get off to a good start in the new academic year. Our goal this year was 75 backpacks and the response was excellent! Some parishioners used the new Amazon wish list and others bought supplies and dropped them off at St. Mary's. ## CONGRATULATIONS, REV. JANETTAROSE!

B ishop Stevenson has appointed our very own the Rev. Janettarose L. Greene Dean of the Arlington Region in the Diocese of Virginia. Effective immediately, she will serve out the remaining term of the Rev. Beth Franklin, who has accepted a call to serve as the rector of St. James Episcopal Church in Richmond.

From a governance perspective, the Diocese is divided into 16 regions, determined by geography. Each region has a Regional Council. The council comprises an elected President, who is a layperson, and a Dean, appointed by the Bishop.

#### **Regional Deans**

The Deans of the 16 regions in the Diocese of Virginia are the representatives of the Bishop in each region. Together with the Presidents, they lead their Regional Council to ensure the ministrations of the church are available to all persons in each region. The Arlington Region comprises nine churches.



The Rev. Janettarose was also unanimously elected to the Board of Trustees of Virginia Theological Seminary and The General Theological Seminary. The combined Board of Trustees is responsible for the institution's planning, evaluation, and financial oversight, with a focus on its mission to educate and form church leaders for a changing world. Key duties include setting rules, establishing professorships, and

electing the Dean and faculty. In terms of governance, all Trustees are Trustees of both institutions. In accepting this collateral assignment, the Rev. Janettarose will work across both Boards and do her part to ensure the best possible decisions are made for each institution in the years to come.

The Rev. Janettarose said, "This is a tremendous honor and will not take away from my duties and responsibilities at St. Mary's. I feel as though this is the first time in my adult life that God is utilizing the entirety of my education and experience to ensure the seminaries will faithfully serve this generation and those to come. I look forward to the opportunity to contribute and serve collaboratively with others in support of the institution's strategic goals, representing its interests with professionalism and respect."

The General Theological Seminary (GTS) and Virginia Theological Seminary (VTS), The Episcopal Church's longest operating seminary and its largest seminary respectively, formally entered into an affiliation agreement in 2022. As the Most Rev. Michael B. Curry, the immediate past Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal church, affirmed, "This new relationship between these two great seminaries of the Church represents a truly creative possibility for faithfully, effectively, and strategically forming leaders for the movement of Jesus Christ through the Church, and for the sake of our 21st century world."

God's blessings abound for us all. Let us congratulate and celebrate the Very Reverend Janettarose L. Greene on her collateral roles at the Seminary and within the Diocese of Virginia. Thanks be to God!

### **CLERGY ANNOUNCEMENTS**

he Diocese of Virginia requires that all clergy, lay leaders, staff, and volunteers be trained in the awareness and prevention of sexual misconduct against children, youth, and adults. We also require that those who have already been trained renew and refresh their training at least every three years. There are two separate training programs, one focusing on children and youth, and one on adults, including elders. If you are serving regularly in a leadership or volunteer capacity at St. Mary's with children, youth, or adults and have not yet completed Safe Church training or have not renewed your training in the last three years, please contact your ministry area leader for additional information.

### GOING DEEPER IN WORSHIP

he Episcopal liturgy has several portions which are typically sung at the main services on Sundays: the psalm, the "ordinary" or repeated portions of the Mass (*Kyrie*; Glory to God; Holy, holy, holy; and Lamb of God or other Fraction Anthem), and hymns. Hymns enrich our liturgy by providing a vehicle for our praise to God, by encouraging our reflection upon his word, and facilitating our prayers.

Hymns are one of the richest treasures of faith and devotion in Christianity. Throughout biblical times and the history of the church, faithful men and women have testified to their faith in Christ and to their knowledge of scripture in poetic form. If you look at the information about the author and composer at the bottom of each hymn in our hymnal and in *Wonder, Love and Praise*, you soon realize that at St. Mary's we sing a wide diversity of hymns from many traditions, places, and times. This body of song is continually expanding in number and in our understanding of who God is and what our response to his message ought to be in this time and place.

Many hymn texts were written as devotional literature or for theological purposes apart from being sung. The editors of our hymnals have, in general, taken care to include hymn texts that reflect the theology, mission, and purpose of the Episcopal Church. Liturgical leaders are duty-bound to select hymns that not only fill an emotional need or an expression, but also communicate the ideas that are consistent with our faith.

The hymns in procession at the beginning and end of the service primarily serve as opportunities for praise and thanksgiving, but may also introduce or reflect upon themes present in the readings for the day. The sequence hymn sung before the gospel is a commentary or "sermon in song" on one of the readings. The hymns at communion are sung primarily as aids to prayer and reflections on the mysteries of Christ coming to us as bread and wine.

Hymns are chosen at St. Mary's with several parameters in mind. Materials published by the Episcopal Church offer suggested hymns for each Sunday, but this is just a beginning point; also taken into consideration are the hymns that are familiar to the St. Mary's community. Hymns are typically chosen for an entire season so that several factors can be observed: the hymns chosen are the best matches for the readings of the day; known hymns are repeated so that they remain known but not worn; and the introduction of lesser-known hymns along with known hymns so that each liturgy contains familiar and less-familiar elements. Records are kept by the Minister of Music to maintain this careful balance. In the Episcopal Church the canons state that all elements of the liturgy, including hymns, are approved by the Rector with consultation from persons skilled in music.

Here are a few suggestions to increase the possibility of God speaking to us through this sacred and living heritage:

- Sing with understanding (I Corinthians 14:15): Allow your feelings to flow in response to your understanding of the words the hymn writer has penned. The most immediate response is often to respond emotionally to the music, sometimes missing the message God may be speaking through the words.
- Speak to one another with psalms, hymns and spiritual songs (Colossians 3:16): Make hymns part of the other six days of the week. Purchase a hymnal for devotional use. Hymn texts from the Hymnal 1982 are available online. Sing hymns on family occasions. Listen to recordings of hymns in your home and while traveling. Use hymns for table grace.

- Sing a new song to the Lord (Psalm 149): Singing new songs can be the result of a growing and inquiring relationship with God. Consider what God can say to you through an unfamiliar hymn.
- Sing unto the Lord (Psalm 95): Think of your singing in corporate worship as something you do first for God, secondly for the encouragement of the assembly, and lastly for yourself.

In the new realities of our world, where our eyes and hearts are being opened to injustices around us, let us bring the songs of our loving Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer to the world. In the new lives through baptism and the resurrection, let us live in thanksgiving to God, being mindful that we the Church are never more alive than when we sing with one voice, a community of saints indivisible by time and space. Alleluia!

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## A LITTLE HISTORY FROM THE ARCHIVES

St. Mary's Mission Statement begins: "At St. Mary's, worship forms the heart of our identity as a Christian community." While we notice obvious changes in our liturgical worship space, we don't always focus on specifics that are familiar.

When the building's *first* renovation was being planned in the early 1950's, Canon Edward N. West of the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York City was consulted. A man with many gifts—a well-known theologian, author, and iconographer—he was also an expert in the design of church furnishings. (Fun fact: He was a great friend of the author Madeleine L'Engle and the inspiration for the character of Canon Tallis in her young adult novels.) Canon West set the focus on the altar and the baptismal font as the two dominant parts of the physical church, conforming to the two greatest spiritual sacraments of our Anglican tradition, Baptism and Holy Eucharist.

So I thought it would be interesting to look back at three elements in the worship space that resonate that focus—the altar, the cross, and the baptismal font—and how they have changed over the years.

The original altar of St. Mary's was against the back wall of the chancel (where our organ now stands). Its approach was surrounded by choir stalls and the organ with a wall hanging behind. The Rixey Memorial window was inserted above it in the wall in 1940. In short, the altar competed for visual attention (right).





Thus, in the 1950's renovation, the altar became free-standing in the center of the sanctuary surrounded by railings on three sides. Four pavement candles marked the platform's four corners; and, with the moving of the Rixey Memorial window to its current position, a new cross hung on the back wall. The only adornment on the altar was two brass candle-sticks. The choir and organ were moved to a newly created loft at the back of the Nave. Two wrought-iron lecterns framed the front ends of the platform (*left*).

During the 1997 renovation, it was determined that the sanctuary needed to be flipped to the opposite end of the church. This accommodated a new organ (no organ builder would put one in the loft), a new chapel, and created common egress from both Glebe and Old Dominion sides of the church as well as access to the new parish hall. The altar design, however, remained the same

with a more open platform to the railings and view of the two side chapels—the votive lights and the aumbry. One dramatic change to the sanctuary was made: the baptismal font was moved forward to replace the gospel side lectern. The immediate focus is the altar and cross and the font is now front and always visible.



The Baptismal Font has had changes as well. The original marble font of the 1920s was donated to St. Dunstan's when it was a mission church. It now resides in their chapel. With the 1950s renovation, a new font was commissioned to be installed in the center of the narthex on top of two hexagonal platforms at the rear of the Nave.

A wooden figure of Jesus was carved atop a column, centered in a wood and copper font. "Canon West explained that the figure of Jesus over the font corresponded to the cross over the altar" (Wallace Andrews' history notes). Visually you could stand in the aisle and there was a direct line of sight from the cross to the font (left). When the font was dedicated in March 1957, Canon West attended.

On the Sundays when baptisms were held, the whole congregation was invited to process to the narthex and surround the font to view the proceedings (right).

With the 1997 renovation, there was not enough room to place the font at the back without removing pews, so the font moved up to the front where it now resides. It was necessary to shorten the column to fit and look visually balanced in the sanctuary space.

The Sanctuary's cross has had the greatest number of changes over the years. In the 1920s, a small brass cross adorned the altar (see first photo). With the 1950s renovations and Canon West's influence, the cross became far more prominent and was hung over the altar.

It was a unique cross with a gilded frame that had a fleur-de-lis carved at each of its points and the points of the intersection of its arms. Hence it is known as a fleury cross. The fleur-de-lis is a symbol associated with both Mary and the Trinity. The unusual feature of the cross was that it held a fabric inset that could be changed to reflect the color of the liturgical season (right). (The cross, altar candlesticks, and pavement candles, all gilded, were designed and made as a group by Louis F. Glasier of New York City.)








In 1967, a polychrome figure of the Christus Rex (Christ the King), was commissioned in Germany, and superimposed on the cross (*left*). Then, at some later date, the figure was removed and the cross was suspended on the wall behind the altar. The Christus Rex was then hung on the rood beam at the front of the sanctuary. (No photo is known to exist of this arrangement.) It was removed from the beam when Fr. Merrow came because most people could only see Jesus' feet. It was then hung in the elevator vestibule (constructed 1990). (*Left*)

Still later, when Easter congregations got so large there needed to be a worship space set up in Paca Hall for overflow, the Christus Rex was hung on the back wall of the stage. It now resides there (right).



While the seasonal change of the cross color was interesting, the removal, switching inset, and rehanging of the cross took its toll (*left*). In 1989, it was in terrible disrepair, and while a Cross Restoration Project was initiated, the futility of such an endeavor soon became clear.













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
